# **Pastor's Letter**



It is July, and, not only does that mean summer has arrived, this year it means that our denomination's General Assembly is meeting. It's being held in Minneapolis, Minnesota this year from July 3<sup>rd</sup> through July 10<sup>th</sup>. As a pastor, I always worry a little during the General Assembly (G.A.) because you never know what may come out of it and what items the news organizations may pick up. Of course it

helps that now we only have to go through this exercise of ecclesiastical government every two years rather than every year, as it was not that long ago. Sometimes needing to save money has its perks!

While I worry about what may come out of the process of a G.A., I am also amazed at what does get accomplished. Having attended three G.A.s in an official capacity, I can say they are a wonderful experience of seeing the Holy Spirit at work. When you realize that many different people come from all over the country with different agendas, gather for committee meetings and then plenary sessions that last until

late in the evening, it is amazing that anything gets done. Yet, many wonderful things happen in the course of a G.A.

This year, there are several important business items coming before the G.A. Perhaps the biggest item is to approve a new, AND THINNER, Book of Order. Over the past several years, a committee has been working on how we can make our Book of Order, which is the book that describes our



government and procedures, simpler and more streamlined. Their final product is coming before this G.A. There will also be new motions concerning the removing of the sections of the Book of Order and the Book of Confessions that do not allow for the ordination of gays and lesbians. The commissioners will hear a report from a committee that has been working for several years on the situation between Israel and Palestine. They will also be considering a recommendation to add a new

confession to our Book of Confessions. And, they will be voting on a new moderator of the denomination who will moderate this meeting and serve as moderator of the denomination until the next G.A. in two years. Fifteen new missionaries and six who have been reappointed will be commissioned at this year's assembly. Plus, there will be a lot of new items from presbyteries and commissioners.



If you want to keep up with what is happening at G.A., you can go to <u>www.pcusa.org</u>, and you will find various sites to log onto for updates. The one thing we can all do is pray for the commissioners and the new moderator. They will be working long, hard hours, and we need to ask God to bless them with energy and wisdom.
