Pastor's Letter

Now that we hopefully have our basements dried out, we can look ahead to the beginning of Spring. It seems that after a winter of a lot of snow for us Spring is in a hurry to get here. With all of the rain in March, we've moved the old saying up a month: "March showers bring April flowers." The Magnolia tree in the Memorial Garden has big buds on it just ready to pop, so be sure to check it out, as the blossoms are so fragrant.

In April, our lectionary reminds us of the impact of that first Easter. It was so big that it takes a whole season to probe its depths. In the season of Easter, which lasts for seven Sundays, the Old Testament readings are replaced with readings from the book of Acts. This reminds us that Easter was a sign of God's love and continued presence which culminates in the Pentecost event. So the readings from Acts describe the struggles of the early Church to come to grips with what it meant to be the Church of Jesus Christ. There were religious questions and political struggles as the Church tried to organize and define itself in the midst of great persecution from both the Roman and Jewish authorities. The season of Easter is a good time for us to consider what it means to be the Church today. I will be preaching a series in April entitled, *The Function of the Church of Jesus Christ*. The idea for this series came from a sermon I did in 2008 when I shared four questions by John Dominic Crossan.

- 1. What is the character of your God?
- 2. *What is the content of your faith?* I talked about this last year during the season of Easter in a series based on the Apostles' Creed
- 3. *What is the function of your church?* The series this month is based on this question.
- 4. *What is the purpose of your worship?* I plan to do a short series on this sometime in the next year.

I hope you will join me for this series. I believe it is important for us to consider this question from time to time that we might be open to new ways of being the Church.

Enjoy the blooming of new life in the world around us this month and in the church, and don't forget to check out the Magnolia tree!

Gifts of Men Sunday

On Sunday, March 21st, we also celebrated Gifts of Men Sunday by honoring Tom Parziale for his many contributions to the congregation and to the community-at-large. Debra Sprague highlighted some of Tom's many efforts, and the Worship Committee prepared a special coffee hour.

Tom first came to the church with his wife, Janet, in 1982. His first involvement was teaching Sunday School as part of a team with Janet. He was involved as one of the church's participants at the Saturday recycling days in town, has coordinated a number of volunteer days at the Community Food Bank in Hillside, and can be seen playing hand bells with the Travnicek Memorial Ringers. Tom joined the Buildings and Grounds Committee in 1993 and, in 1995, took over as Chairperson, where remains today. Tom has been very active on this committee, organizing various activities. On a weekly basis, he usually does a walkthrough of the church complex to make sure there are no issues. He works closely with all contractors and with the management of the Montessori School.

Tom has been teaching Sunday School for the past 10 years and is also an active member of the Christian Education Committee. You can find his Jr. High and High School class meeting every Sunday in a circle set up in Pollard Hall. We hear his lessons are a cross between stand-up comedy, scripture reviews, and a current events lesson. In the words of one member, "Tom has



made teaching Sunday School more than just meeting once a week with a small group and telling a Bible story. He has embarked on a mission to help our children feel God's presence in their lives. He has made this time a fun refuge for our children and shared with them his compassion for the world."

Community Food Bank of NJ

Here are some statistics from the 2009 Food Bank Newsletter: 830,000 people were helped by the Community Food Bank of NJ in 2009. That is a 45% increase over the 2005 statistics. 1000 children identified as being at risk of being hungry on weekends were provided weekly nutritious food packs. 1200 children of low income families were provided a hot meal every school day in their after-school program. The mobile pantry delivered food to needy senior citizens each month. 33 million pounds of food and groceries (10 million pounds more than in 2008) were distributed.

Volunteers provide the needed function of getting donated food and grocery products sorted for distribution. Without the sorting, the food can't be distributed!

The church is planning another volunteer morning at the Community Food Bank on Saturday, May 8th, from 9-11:30. We usually meet at the church around 8:00 and carpool to Hillside. The minimum age for volunteers is 12 years old. The Community Food Bank of New Jersey is located at 31 Evans Terminal Road in Hillside. Please contact Tom Parziale if you can join the team that will be helping that morning, or sign-up in Pollard Hall.
