Pastor's Letter

One of the things I've realized about living in a city or suburb is that it is easy to lose the sense of the miracle of the harvest. Having grown up in a city in Indiana, we were not far from the corn, wheat, and soybean fields in the countryside all around us. In the Spring, we saw the fresh tilled and planted soil, then the shoots beginning to grow we always said it was going to be a good year if the corn was knee high by the fourth of July. Then, the harvest came in the Fall, and the ground lay fallow until the next Spring when the whole process began again. We knew the farmers put in a lot of work, but the crops grew without any human help--except maybe for some fertilizer. What we were aware of is that there is a miracle in the growth of the crops. The growing season and harvest remind us that there are other forces at work in our universe.



As we come upon Thanksgiving this year, I hope we can reconnect with that sense of God at work in our midst. It has been a difficult year or even several years for many people. We've been involved in wars, experienced financial meltdowns, lost jobs, etc., but, through it all, there is this miraculous force that continues to create life over and over again. A number of years ago I came across the story of a young mother who escaped from the Nazis by hiding in the pit of a mass grave and, while she was there, she went into labor and gave birth to her newborn child. In the pit of death, new life began. In the midst of profound difficulties, people can find new beginnings. That is what we should be thankful for this year. Our thanksgiving is not so much about what we have or have been given materially, but that we have a God who continues to bless us when we don't feel blessed, that in the bare ground of our difficult lives lies the beginning of new life and new hope. I want to close with some of the words to that familiar Thanksgiving hymn, *We Plow the Fields*:

We plow the fields and scatter The good seed on the land, But it is fed and watered By God's almighty hand: He sends the snow in winter, The warmth to swell the grain, The breezes and the sunshine, And soft, refreshing rain. Refrain:

All good gifts around us Are sent from heaven above; Then thank the Lord, O thank the Lord, For all His love.

May God bless each of us with a sense of the miracle of new life in each of us this Thanksgiving.

Taizé Service




