Pastor's Letter

The famous early 20th century novelist, Thomas Mann, once wrote that:

Time has no divisions to mark its passage; there is never a thunderstorm or blare of trumpets to announce the beginning of a new month or year. Even when a new century begins, it is only we mortals who ring bells and fire off pistols.

If we did not have a calendar, we would not even know that a year had taken place. In many ways, the idea of a year helps us to create boundaries so that we don't get that same chill we get when we look up into a clear night sky out in the country far from artificial light and see the millions of stars that remind us that the universe is infinite. The year helps us break up infinite time into blocks that we can handle. Granted, there is a cyclical nature to the movement of the sun, upon which our concept of the year is based. But, the concept of time and blocks of time such as days

our concept of the year is based. But, the concept of time and blocks of time such as days, months, years, etc. are human constructs to create a sense of order and stability in our lives.

A number of years ago, I shared with you about how after my dad died my mother, who had always enjoyed New Years' Eve, never liked it again. She said that there had always been the feeling that, "we made it through another year." But on New Years Eve 1982, she said, "we didn't make it this year." January 1 is a kind of mile marker in time. We look over the past and remember, but we also look ahead to the future and wonder what's coming. But we don't do this introspection in a vacuum. I recall the words of the writer of the New Testament book of Hebrews, who said,

Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever. (13:8)

While time marches on, we are reminded that the Word that was at the beginning, and will be at the end, does not change. In a world where things change daily, even hourly, The Son is the one constant we can continue to count on. That is truly something to ring bells, shoot off fireworks, and drop lighted balls about.

In January, which is the beginning of the season of Epiphany, the scriptures all reflect on who Jesus is. They seek to help us discover who the one born in the manger is for the world and for us as individuals, and it begins with the words from heaven: <u>This is my Son with whom I am pleased</u>. And that has not changed from the beginning of time: God's time or our time.
