Pastor's Letter

This month I am using my wife, Rev. Barbara Peters' newsletter article about Christmas. I hope it will help you to reflect on the real meaning of this season. Tom

T'is the season for... catalogs! The inundation has begun in earnest, right? Catalogs, fliers, and advertisements that invite us to enjoy "one day only" shopping specials fill our already over-stuffed mailboxes. What an amazing cultural phenomena!

According to the Natural Resources Defense Council:

- Each year, 19 billion catalogs are mailed to American consumers.
- Catalog production uses approximately 3.6 million tons of paper, derived from 8.3 million tons of wood.
- The wood needed for catalogs equals 53 million trees, which is equivalent to the number of trees in 2,000 Central Parks.

It is interesting to me that the reason catalogs came into existence in the first place was actually a fairly noble one. By the late 1800's, mail could be delivered to rural areas. Companies like Montgomery Ward and Sears Roebuck offered a way to link farm families to goods city folks enjoyed through their mail-order houses. This provided an equalizing factor to society. Because of catalogs, fashions weren't only available to upper and middle-class city dwellers any longer (those who had ready access to department stores). In addition, the convenience of mail-order was life changing for people in outlying areas. No longer did they have to defer purchases to the next trip into town. By the early 1900s, Montgomery Ward and Sears Roebuck catalogs were delivered twice a year. Eventually, kits could be bought to build your own home by ordering them from a Sears catalog. If you wanted to build a large, five-room cottage in 1911, you could order "Modern Home #106" for \$1,145, and everything you needed to build it would be delivered to your local train station. Some of these homes made from kits sold through Sears are actually still standing today! As a child of the 60's, I remember how much fun it was after Thanksgiving to get the big Sears "Wish Book" in the mail. I could spend hour pouring over the pages, as did all the other kids my age.

Well, times have certainly changed, and I don't think for the better in this regard. The treadmill of consumerism is alive and well. The following lyrics by Erica Avery, sung to the tune of Silver Bells, seem to say it all:

City sidewalks, busy sidewalks, lined with advertising, It's the big retail season of Christmas. Children begging for each new thing Toys for mile after mile And the mood of the season is clear.

Buy and sell, Buy and sell, It's Christmas time for consumers. Ching-a-ching, Cash tills ring, Must we spend Christmas this way?



I know I'm preaching to the choir when I suggest we all take a step back and notice the spectacle Christmas has become when seen through the lens of commerce and materialism. I simply want to be one of those many voices which invite us to walk to a different drummer this time of year so that the spiritual significance of Christmas doesn't get lost in the shuffle. It can make such a difference, don't you think?
