## **Pastor's Letter**

If you Google "Thanksgiving quotes," you get a lot of pithy sayings about Thanksgiving: what it is about, how to be thankful, and humorous thoughts about Thanksgiving. I came across the following quote about Thanksgiving by the late author and comedienne, Erma Bombeck:



What we're really talking about is a wonderful day set aside on the fourth Thursday of November when no one diets. I mean, why else would they call it *Thanksgiving*? "No One Diets on Thanksgiving" 26 November 1981

What is wonderful about Thanksgiving is that it is not just a day, but a way of life. Edward Sandford Martin, a writer, humorist, editor, founder of "The Harvard Lampoon," and co-founder and first editor of the original "Life" magazine, wrote the following:

Thanksgiving Day comes, by statute, once a year; to the honest man (and woman) it comes as frequently as the heart of gratitude will allow.

Thanksgiving is a way of life. It seeks to express gratitude for all that we have - even if what we have is not much. Melody Beattie, who wrote the 1987 bestseller *Codependent No More*, writes about Thanksgiving:

Gratitude unlocks the fullness of life. It turns what we have into enough, and more. It turns denial into acceptance, chaos to order, confusion to clarity. It can turn a meal into a feast, a house into a home, a stranger into a friend. Gratitude makes sense of our past, brings peace for today, and creates a vision for tomorrow.

However, one of the best ideas of Thanksgiving I have come across is from the 13<sup>th</sup> to 14<sup>th</sup> century philosopher, theologian, and mystic, Meister Eckhart:

*If the only prayer you said in your whole life was, "thank you," that would suffice.*

I share these thoughts with you as you reflect on your upcoming celebration of Thanksgiving. Do we say *thank you* enough?

**New Beginnings Update****- Lore Pateman**

The New Beginnings house meetings have been completed. All 4 groups came to the same conclusion: the New Beginnings option that fits our church is Mission Redefinition. Mission Redefinition is:



Churches that seek to change may need to establish a whole new way of being a church. While all congregations will need to do visioning about their future mission opportunities, most congregations will do so alongside a redevelopment opportunity. Sometimes, however, there are congregations who “could be” the right church in the right place with a significant shift in missional focus. This option requires of the congregation significant energy, ingenuity, creativity, and spirituality because people will be leaving behind previous ministry entirely and doing a very new focus in ministry. It is important to note that there is no guarantee of numerical growth by entering Mission Redefinition. It also is important to note how well – or even if – the congregation can sustain its ministry through what may be a years-long process.

**Next Steps**

One thing everyone agreed on is that we don’t know our community’s needs very well. So, the next step is to go out into the community and talk to various groups to gather information about what our community needs. Our goal is to have the conversations completed by November 14<sup>th</sup>. Then, the New Beginnings leaders will come back together and develop a cohesive decision about the future and bring that report to the session and congregation for further discussion and adoption.

Please keep our congregation in your prayers. This decision is sizeable and will have long-reaching effects on the community, our congregation, and the Kingdom of God.

**Annual Election Meeting**
