Pastor's Letter

Well the Supreme Court has spoken on the Affordable Healthcare Act, the election campaigns are in full attack mode, the summer is hot, and we have to wait another month for the Olympic Games. In many ways, it feels like it is going to be a long hot summer, literally and figuratively. People are angry, and civility has been out the window for some time now. I want to encourage each of you to practice grace for yourself and for others.

Some time ago, I was getting very upset by what I was reading on blogs and hearing on the news. I felt that our country was heading into a deep pit. A friend of mine gave me permission to step back and not worry about it. I have taken that bit of advice to heart. Now when I feel like things are getting too hot or dark, I just stop reading the blogs and stop listening to the news. It is a way of being graceful to myself. I was also captured by the quote by Johann von Goethe that I started my June 24th sermon with:



A person should hear a little music, read a little poetry, and see a fine picture every day of their life, in order that worldly cares may not obliterate the sense of the beautiful which God has implanted in the soul.

As things heat up this summer, consider being graceful to yourself and do what Goethe suggests. Listen to music, read poetry or a fun book, or look at a fine picture. If you can't go to an art museum or gallery, then look one up on the computer and contemplate it online. Many of the pictures I use on the front of the church bulletins come from the website, <u>www.biblical-art.com</u>. You can find many great pieces of artwork on biblical themes and passages on this website. Be kind to yourself and find ways to experience good things in your life. Look for good news and funny news rather than political and economic news.

When it comes to others, if someone expresses a viewpoint you don't agree with and you don't want to be drawn into an argument with them, then don't. Just say to them, "that is one way to look at that," and move on. Relationships are too important to let hot issues and temperatures get in the way. Of course, Jesus knew this as he was building relationships everywhere he went. He built relationships with tax collectors, Pharisees, emotionally unstable people, people with diseases, etc. His life encourages us to live the same way.

Also, I would remind you that you can get out of the heat by coming to church at 9:30 a.m. on Sundays during July and August and on September 2nd. (Except on July 15th and 22nd when the service will be at the Meyersville church at 9:00 a.m.)

This year's series includes a diverse range of topics, led by pastors and lay members of the three congregations. If you cannot attend the entire series, please join us when you can as each week's topic "stands alone." Following is the schedule for this series, along with a brief description of each discussion.

July 11 - Tom Peters – "Divine Inspiration and the Word of God"

There is a huge difference between declaring that we are inspired by Psalm 23 and declaring that Psalm 23 is the inspired word of God. One depends upon our understanding; the other lies in the nature of Scripture itself. It is this latter claim that constitutes the subject of this study. We will explore understanding the concept of the Bible as revelation and the concept of inspiration.

July 18 - Barbara Aspinall – "Books That Didn't Make the Bible and Why"

How did Christians decide which books got into the New Testament? What about all the ones that didn't...and should we care?

July 25 - Heather Harris-Galgoci - "The Gospel According to Judas"

How should Christians view the recently published Gospel of Judas? Does it help us understand the life and ministry of Jesus? Or does it confuse things?

August 1 - Tom Parziale – "What the Bible Says About Ecology"

The Bible may not use terms such as "global warming" or "fossil fuels," but it does teach us our place and responsibility in the Creation story, which can guide our actions today.

August 8 - Cyndy Reames – "Will They Know We Are Christians By Our Love?"

In this session, we will explore the ways in which we give and receive love. Based on the books of Dr. Gary Chapman, we will discover our own primary love language and how to "speak" the languages of others.
