## **Pastor's Letter**

I recently came across this poem by the Old Testament scholar and writer, Rev. Dr. Walter Brueggemann. I offer it to you as we look to the beginning of Lent on Ash Wednesday, February 13<sup>th</sup>.

### Marked by Ashes

Ruler of the Night, Guarantor of the day . . .

This day — a gift from you.

This day — like none other you have ever given, or we have ever received.

This Wednesday dazzles us with gift and newness and possibility.

This Wednesday burdens us with the tasks of the day, for we are already halfway home  
halfway back to committees and memos,  
halfway back to calls and appointments,  
halfway on to next Sunday,  
halfway back, half frazzled, half expectant,  
half turned toward you, half rather not.

This Wednesday is a long way from Ash Wednesday,  
but all our Wednesdays are marked by ashes —  
we begin this day with that taste of ash in our mouth:  
of failed hope and broken promises,  
of forgotten children and frightened women,  
we ourselves are ashes to ashes, dust to dust;  
we can taste our mortality as we roll the ash around on our tongues.

We are able to ponder our ashness with  
some confidence, only because our every Wednesday of ashes  
anticipates your Easter victory over that dry, flaky taste of death.

On this Wednesday, we submit our ashen way to you —  
you Easter parade of newness.  
Before the sun sets, take our Wednesday and Easter us,  
Easter us to joy and energy and courage and freedom;  
Easter us that we may be fearless for your truth.  
Come here and Easter our Wednesday with  
mercy and justice and peace and generosity.

We pray as we wait for the Risen One who comes soon.



### **Lenten Sermon Series**

During Lent, Rev. Peters will offer a sermon series on, "How do we talk with others about God?" The mandate is to go into the world and make disciples (Matthew 28). We don't like doing that, but that does not negate the mandate. In not talking about what we believe, we have let others who do talk about their faith frame the mission and description of the Christian Church, and many have been turned off by what they *hear* the church is about. It is time for us to redefine for people what we believe the Church is about, and this sermon series will attempt to do that. The scripture passages provided are the lectionary passages for each of the Sundays, but Rev. Peters will not be using the lectionary passages for his Lenten sermon series.

**Confirmation Class****- Rev. Peters**

On Sunday, Jan. 20<sup>th</sup>, a group of 15 people from our church and Meyersville P.C. attended worship at the Orthodox Cathedral of the Holy Virgin Protection in lower Manhattan. This is the fifth time Rev. Peters has taken the confirmation class to attend worship there. We had 8 confirmands and 7 adults attend this year. As in the past, Father Christopher (the Dean of the Cathedral) and Deacon Michael talked with the group before and after the two-hour service. During the service, Rev. Mike (a former Presbyterian Minister who is now a member there) explained what was happening. He also explained to the confirmands that Rev. Peters likes them to worship there to help them understand what Christian worship has descended from. Rev. Peters believes that in Orthodox worship you see the bridge from Judaism to Christianity.

After attending coffee hour, the group went to St. John the Divine Episcopal Cathedral in upper Manhattan. There Revs. Peters and Aspinall talked with the group about the Cathedral and what the architecture said about their worship and beliefs. The group left Long Hill Twp. at 7:20 a.m. and returned at 4:00 p.m.

9. Social gathering place for Spanish people in the community; in particular, for young men in town


**Christian Education Committee****- Lore Pateman****Souper Bowl Collection**

**The Teachings of Jesus: The Beatitudes and What They Mean for Our Lives Today**

*Jesus himself lived out the Beatitudes in his earthly life and called his followers to do the same. We will examine our lifestyle in the light of Jesus' radical teaching and determine how best to live out these values now. We hope that this two-pronged approach to studying the Beatitudes will deepen our understanding of Jesus and challenge our personal values and help us understand how they should impact our approach to major global issues, such as environmental pollution and the deep-seated hostilities and injustices that afflict our world.*

**Church Flowers**






