Pastor's Letter

Last Sunday, we approved our new Vision and Mission Statements (see page 3 of newsletter). It was an exciting time, but now we have to do the hard work to begin to follow our new vision and mission. I say *hard work* because to really be intentional about it we have to change our way of thinking. This became even clearer to me in a recent article sent out by our new Presbytery Leader, Rev. Jeanne Radak (Rev. Radak will be preaching here on June 23<sup>rd</sup> on the topic of being a missional church). Jeanne quotes a friend of hers, Rob Moss, who wrote:



We've decided to quit being a welcoming church. No kidding. We're giving it up. It won't be easy, but we're committed to it...Like so many churches, we've sunk an amazing amount of time and energy into becoming a welcoming church. We changed worship styles, we trained greeters and ushers, we wore name tags, we percolated coffee, we went to workshops on hospitality, we put our friendliest people in the most prominent places on Sunday mornings...Here's what we're doing instead. We are becoming an Inviting Church. That's different. You see, "welcoming," from a missional perspective, is passive. It denotes waiting for visitors and guests to drop by...Welcoming is about us, not about them.

"Inviting," however, is different. That means we leave the comfort of our congregational home-court advantage. The main activity doesn't happen in our worship space when people drop in, but in the neighborhood when we go out. It isn't so much welcoming them into our place, but going out into their place and meeting them there.

Being a missional church is not about us, but is about the other person, about the community. This is a new way of thinking for us. It is not about "saving" our little church, but being the ministry of Christ in our community, in our stores, at the ball fields, along the parade route, wherever we are. We are definitely a welcoming church, but now let's become an inviting church!

# Book Study on Tues., June 18<sup>th</sup>, 7:30 p.m.

The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks, by Rebecca Skloot, was named by more than 60 critics as one of the best books of 2010. One reviewer said, "Vivid . . . Reads like a novel . . . A Deftly crafted investigation of a social wrong committed by the medical establishment as well as the scientific and medical miracles to which it led."

Her name was Henrietta Lacks, but scientists know her as *HeLa*. She was a poor black tobacco farmer whose cells - taken without her knowledge in 1951 - became one of the most important tools in medicine, vital for developing the polio vaccine, cloning, gene mapping, in-vitro fertilization, and more. Henrietta's cells have been bought and sold by the billions, yet she remains virtually unknown, and her family can't afford health insurance.

# **Ongoing Mission Programs**

#### Township Food Pantry
