## **Pastor's Letter**

In the past three months, I have been approached twice by people wanting to know if I believe in the same God they believe in. These people knew what they believed and wanted to see if I spoke the same language about God that they did. Both seemed rather incredulous when I didn't speak their language and that I was a minister. I'm sure they both think I am leading all of you to a very unpleasant place.

They wanted to know if I believe in heaven and hell. My response to them was that I really did not think much about heaven and hell. I shared with both of them that I believe Jesus and all of the prophets and prophetesses of the Bible want us to be more concerned about how we lived this life. Our job is to do all that we can to create, with God's help, heaven on earth, or at least in our own little part of earth. Neither of my inquisitors wanted to hear about that. They only wanted to hear that the right beliefs led to rewards in heaven, and wrong beliefs led to the other place.

Jesus and the disciples challenged the people to live lives of justice and love for all people, and not just those we like. That is what Jesus meant when he said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life." Not that we had to go *through* him, but that we had to live *like* him. We have to live the life he lived. I share all of this because during the month of October we will have several opportunities to reflect and contribute to bringing the Kingdom to our part of the world and elsewhere.

On October 6<sup>th</sup>, we will once again celebrate communion with Christians around the world – a reminder that it is not just about us, but God's people are in every nook and cranny of this ball we call *Earth*. This came home to me recently when we were in the throes of deciding whether to bomb Syria because of their alleged use of chemical weapons. The Presbyterian Church (USA) sent out a letter that it had received from The National Evangelical Synod of Syria and Lebanon in which they asked that the "international powers refrain from the use of power against Syria as it would only multiply the suffering and human destruction." World Communion reminds us that we all are accountable to each other because, through God, we are a part of each other. On October 6<sup>th</sup>, we will also begin collecting our annual offering for peacemaking, which reminds us of our vocation to be peacemakers.

During the Session and Deacons retreat at Chatham Township Presbyterian Church on October 12<sup>th</sup>, we will be looking at our new mission statement and deciding what we want to accomplish this year towards that statement and how we can do that. On Sunday, October 20<sup>th</sup>, we will once again participate in the New Providence CROP walk. It is an opportunity to raise funds to combat hunger and be a visible presence to remind everyone that there are hungry people around us all the time – even in the richest nation in the world.

So, this month I ask you to help out in any way you can. Let's be about the business of creating a just and peaceful kingdom.

You will notice that Rev. Peters is using a new classification for the *Ordinary* Sundays, which are those Sundays that fall between *Epiphany* and *Transfiguration*. They resume after *Pentecost* and continue until *Reign of Christ Sunday*. They are called *Ordinary* because there are no special celebrations during those times. They are services/readings for the ordinary days in the life of the church. They are numbered consecutively, with *Baptism of the Lord Sunday* being Ordinary 1 and Ordinary 33 being the Sunday before *Reign of Christ Sunday*.

Lent and Easter move every year due to the 325CE, the Council of Nicaea determination that Easter Sunday be held on the first full moon on or after the vernal equinox (March 21<sup>st</sup>). For this reason, some *Ordinary* Sundays are not celebrated every year. The "C" in the classification means that we are in the "C cycle" of the lectionary; there are three yearly cycles (A,B,C). For every Sunday and special celebration in the lectionary, there are 4 readings: Old Testament, Psalm, New Testament, and Gospel.

On October 16, 1945, the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations was founded, built upon its belief that the goal of freedom from want of food, suitable and adequate for the health and strength of all people can be achieved. Celebrated around the world, World Food Day honors that day and our commitment to defeating hunger. Many think that hunger is about too many people and too little food. But that's not true. Our planet produces enough food to feed every woman, man, and child. Instead, hunger is about power. Its roots lie in inequalities in access to resources. Right now, many farmers in poor countries—the people who grow the food the world relies on—don't have the power to access the resources they need to thrive.

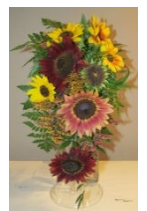
