Pastor's Letter

Forgiveness

<u> April 2014</u>

Recently, I came across the following:

One lady wrote to a question and answer forum: "Dear Sirs, Our preacher said on Easter that Jesus just swooned on the cross and that the disciples nursed Him back to health. What do you think? Sincerely, Bewildered."

"Dear Bewildered, Beat your preacher with a cat-of-nine-tails with 39 heavy strokes; nail him to a cross; hang him in the sun for 6 hours; run a spear thru his side...put him in an airless tomb for 36 hours, and see what happens. Sincerely, Charles."

A lot of people have theories about what happened to Jesus on the cross, and some of the theories have been around since the death of Jesus. What happened, though, is not nearly as important as why it happened. We often refer to the crucifixion and the events preceding it as the *Passion of Christ*. This understanding of the word "passion" comes from the Latin noun *passio*, meaning "suffering." Although, one could say that the passion of Christ was because of Christ's passion. In their book, *The Last Week*, Marcus Borg and John Dominic Crossan write in the preface:

We also use "passion" for any consuming interest, dedicated enthusiasm, or concentrated commitment...The first passion of Jesus was the kingdom of God, namely, to incarnate the justice of God by demanding for all a fair share of a world belonging to and ruled by the covenantal God of Israel. It was that first passion for God's distributive justice that led inevitably to the second passion by Pilate's punitive justice.

The pre-resurrection Christ lived his life bringing hope and justice to the fringes of society, to the people without a voice. We have to remember he grew up in a family that was in one of the lowest classes of society, the tradesman class, since his earthly father was a carpenter. How can we forget the beautiful words of his mother when she heard that she would give birth to God's Son?

"My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior, for he has looked with favor on the lowliness of his servant...He has shown strength with his arm; he has scattered the proud in the thoughts of their hearts. He has brought down the powerful from their thrones and lifted up the lowly; he has filled the hungry with good things, and sent the rich away empty."

Jesus was killed because he threatened power structures. Yet, even on the cross, he could not accuse those who killed him. He forgave them. That is the beginning of the promise of the resurrection as a result of his great love and grace. As we continue our journey to Jerusalem and the third day and beyond, may we become passionate about His love and justice for all people.


Joint-Church Lenten Sunday Soup Supper and Study Series

Bring your unwanted or unused medicines for proper disposal. The collection site will be near the entrance of the Warren Police Station at 44 Mountain Boulevard. The service is free and anonymous.

Flushing medicines down the toilet in homes that use septic tanks can leach into the ground and seep into ground water. Pouring medicines down the sink or in the toilet in residences connected to wastewater treatment plants allows the medicines to pass through the treatment system and enter rivers and lakes. The medicines may contaminate community drinking water.

This is a truly secure way for everyone to make their medicine cabinets safer for children and the environment. <u>Residents (and non-residents) are urged to participate</u>.

Road to Bridges

Change (and more) collected during coffee hour supports Bridges Program, providing 40 lunches per month for NJ/NY homeless.
