Pastor's Letter

As I sit and write this, I have just received the news that David Bird's body has been found and positively identified. While I am sure the family was hoping for a more positive outcome, they now can find some closure to this year-long mystery. While many questions may remain unanswered, some important ones have been and will be answered. Not knowing is so difficult. The human mind is so conditioned to seeking resolutions. In music there are some chords that you don't put at the end of a song because they leave you hanging – you have to resolve them by moving to another chord.



I bring this up because this Easter the lectionary invites us to look at the resurrection account through the eyes of the writer of the Gospel of Mark. Of the four resurrection accounts, Mark's is probably the least favorite because it leaves one hanging:

So they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid. (16:8)

In the early centuries after Christ, other endings, as many as three, were added to resolve the uncomfortable feeling left by what most scholars believe to be the original ending in 16:8. We like resolution. We crave resolution. However, in the Gospel of Mark, the earliest of the four Gospels, the unresolved ending is very powerful because it empowers us to find resolution – to find the resurrection. We are encouraged to go back to Galilee. This will be the subject of my Easter sermon, and I encourage you to join us to, in the words of Paul Harvey, *hear the rest of the story*.

For now, we can continue to hold Nancy, her two teen-aged children, and the rest of the Bird family in our prayers and ask God to comfort and strengthen them. We can also remind ourselves that life does not always have resolutions, or ones that we like; but, God is with us – God has the last word. Christ, dead on the cross, demanded a resolution, and God gave it on the third day.

May God's peace and strength be with us as we prepare to go through the events of Holy Week.



Easter Turkey/Ham Donations



"It's an honor to accept this award on behalf of The Raptor Trust, and especially on behalf of my father. He spent his entire lifetime as a devoted environmentalist and educator. He was committed to the idea that all wild creatures deserve our understanding. He helped those creatures directly through his rehabilitation efforts, and in the 30-plus years since The Raptor Trust's formation, we have cared for over 90,000 wild birds right here in Long Hill Township."

Road to Bridges

Change (and more) collected during coffee hour supports Bridges Program, providing 40 lunches per month for NJ/NY homeless.

Township Food Pantry

Items can be left in baskets labeled "Food Pantry Donations" in the Church narthex and on the table outside of Pollard Hall.

Toiletries
