

Pastor's Letter

Recently, I've had several experiences that caused me to remember Michael Norton's words in the lecture we listened to in November about, "Does money buy happiness?" He talked about the fact that we get disappointed when we buy something but we can't get it right away. We want it now. He talked about how money buys us happiness when we can look forward to it, like a trip or an experience we plan for.

On November 18th, I went to the assisted living facility where I do two monthly services and, in the lobby, there was a 10-foot Christmas tree all decorated. I looked over to the receptionist and said, "It's too early." She just rolled her eyes and shook her head in agreement. Today, Barbara and I flew down to Knoxville, Tennessee to visit her mother for Thanksgiving. I was mindful of the thought that, yes, we get there fast, but it's a very tiring way to travel. It kind of feels like it's too fast.

I bring up these experiences because they reflect something about the nature and meaning of the season of Advent. I've said many times that Advent prevents us from getting to Christmas too fast. Advent gives us time to look forward to Christmas and, as we do, we reflect on what it means for us. Advent gives us time to think about what happened and why. Think of the build-up to that first Christmas. According to the story, Mary had been visited by an angel who told her she was going to give birth to the Messiah. She became pregnant and had to deal with telling Joseph that she was pregnant. She had a lot to think about during her pregnancy and the arduous 80-mile journey to Bethlehem. Was this really the Messiah she was expecting? What would Joseph do once the child was born? I'm sure there was much soul searching on the way to Bethlehem, not to mention the trip probably took 3-4 days. The story didn't just happen overnight, and there was a lot of reflection.



I hope you will take some time during Advent to ask yourself, *What do I believe about Christmas? What are my expectations of this Christmas?* Spend some time in silent reflection on these questions. Read the Christmas story in Matthew and Luke in chapters one and two. Let this Advent be a time to intentionally slow down the rush to Christmas, and prepare yourself spiritually for the announcement of the angel to the shepherds. Take your time getting to Bethlehem.

She is also a flute instructor at Montclair State University Preparatory Center for the Arts and 2nd flutist with the Adelphi Chamber Orchestra. 
Please plan to join us for an afternoon of beautiful music. Admission is free; donations are welcome. A brief reception will follow the concert.



Road to Bridges

Change (and more) collected during coffee hour supports Bridges Program, providing 40 lunches per month for NJ/NY homeless.

Township Food Pantry

Toiletries
