## Pastor's Letter

By the time you read this, we will have begun the season of Advent. Advent is a time of waiting. As I reflected on this theme of waiting, I was mindful of the fact that in today's society we are losing the ability to wait. We can order something online and, if we are willing to pay for it, it will be on our doorstep the next morning. Recently I have had several conversations concerning the number of divorces today, around 50%. I've experienced families torn apart by politics or other things because someone would not change their ideas. I blame it partly on our inability to wait, to let things work out, or to take the time to work on the issues. Waiting gives us space... space to reflect, to envision something being different than what it is now.



However, waiting demands something of us. Waiting demands that we put our own needs or feelings aside to contemplate something different, something that is coming. This is what Advent waiting is all about--contemplating what the birth of Jesus really meant and means for the world and for us. As you have heard me say many times before, Advent keeps us from getting to Christmas too fast. Advent gives us time to think about a God who loves the world so much that he sends an infant child to save us. What does that mean, why not a warrior on a horse with a flaming sword? We need time to ponder these things just as Mary needed time. It wasn't until she got together with her older and wiser cousin that she began to understand what was happening and what it meant.



I challenge you this Advent season to take some time to hold one of your crèche figures and look at it; contemplate what the good news of the birth of Jesus meant for who that figure represents. Consider the lowly shepherd, think about the innkeeper, consider the majestic magi, the triumphant angel, the poor carpenter father, and, of course, the adolescent mother. What did they think when they heard the news? What would you have thought if you had been in their place?

In the dark days of winter, let us put our waiting to good use so that we might be ready to hear the good news once again on Christmas Eve/Christmas Day.



Thank you to our 15 volunteers who worked at the Community Food Bank in Hillside on Sat., Nov. 12<sup>th</sup>. Our group included members of the Meyersville Church and the MOMS Club that meets at our church. This time our task was to transform huge bins of loose pasta into enough dinner-sized packages of pasta to feed over 1,200 families. This was accomplished by our group working along with 21 volunteers from other organizations. As usual, we worked hard and had a great time!



All the work was done while we sported the latest in hairnet fashion. According to the food bank employee who worked with us, we filled 164 boxes with 2,624 bags of pasta, which will feed 1,312 families through food pantries around the state. Job well done!

We will be scheduling two trips in 2017 (most likely in May and October). Once they are scheduled, we will provide you with the dates.


