# Pastor's Letter

Last night at the first of our Lenten Soup and Study sessions, we began our discussion of Borg and Crossan's book, *The Last Week: A Day-by-Day Account of Jesus' Final Week in Jerusalem.* The book challenges us to see the events of Holy Week in a very different way from what we generally have thought about them. We talked about the triumphal entry we celebrate on Palm Sunday and how



it was a judgement of the domination system perpetrated by Rome in collaboration with the priests of the temple. We talked about the story of Jesus chasing out the money-changers and how faith during Jesus' time was about worship and not about justice. Jesus' words and acts were a symbolic destruction of the temple, which happened in reality almost 40 years later when the Romans destroyed the temple.

I mention all of this because this kind of study takes us out of our comfort zones and causes us to reflect and perhaps rethink our understandings and actions as Christians and as the Church, which, to my mind, is what the season of Lent is all about. As I shared in my sermon yesterday, it is so easy to construct a Christianity and a Church around our specifications. We take the world we live in and mash it up with the words of scripture and see what appears. However, that is not how it is to be done. We are supposed to start with the scriptures and end with the scriptures. That is the only way we can be in the world and not of the world, as Jesus was. The writer of the Gospel of John reminds us of this in the words of Jesus' long prayer in John 17:14-16:

I have given them your word, and the world has hated them because they do not belong to the world, just as I do not belong to the world. <sup>15</sup>I am not asking you to take them out of the world, but I ask you to protect them from the evil one. <sup>16</sup>They do not belong to the world, just as I do not belong to the world.

Lent and Holy Week is our time, along with Advent, to take ourselves out of the world, to clear our eyes and reset our understanding with God. In our current election cycle, we are hearing so many different things coming out of candidates' mouths regarding what Christianity and Christ are all about. Some of it is not even Christian. We need to be clear about not only who Christ was, but also why he did and said the things he did and said. I hope you will take time to read and reflect on the scriptures during this Lent. Pick a Gospel and read a little of it each day during your Lenten journey. Attend the services of worship, especially during Holy Week, when there is a tendency to not attend Maundy Thursday or Good Friday because they are too depressing. They are important touchstones to what it means to be a follower of Christ. If you truly want to feel the joy of the Day of Resurrection, then you need to experience the whole of Holy Week.

May God bless you and all of us in our journey.

#### Road to Bridges
