Recently, I came across the following:

If you are ever on Facebook (and many are), you know what it's like at year's end to be bombarded by countless friends' "Year In Review" photo montages. It's all part of Facebook's endless crusade to keep their users actively engaged in the site.

The problem for many, however, is that Facebook automatically generates these montages without a user's consent. Admittedly, they do not post them publicly without consent (a user must select the option to "post" the review), but that doesn't stop FB from creating them and then inserting them into your news feed, repeatedly, in the hopes that you'll eventually opt to post the review. This keeps your page active, generates lots of "likes" and "comments" from your friends, and, overall, boosts Facebook's exposure and vitality.

While many are all too happy to look back at the past year and smile at the images from the past twelve months, for others it's a painful intrusion into a chapter of their lives they'd just as well leave locked in the vaults of yesterday.

# Pastor's Coffee Klatch



# Family Promise & Our Promise Programs of Morris County

January 2018

Many of us are familiar with the Family Promise Program of Morris County. Local churches, including ours, are part of the network that provides temporary housing and meals to those in the program as they try to get back on their feet. In the past year, we helped provide 4,880 nights of shelter. The program was at 95% capacity, which allowed more people than ever to be sheltered.

Are you aware of the *Our Promise* program? Family Promise of Morris County has expanded! Building on the agency's long history of serving homeless clients, they have partnered with the First Baptist Church of Morristown to start a new program serving the local homeless population in Morristown. Officially named *Our Promise*, the program is based out of the church basement, staffed by professionals, and provides the following services: phone and computer access, mailing address, restrooms, warming/cooling center, information and referrals, linkage to medical and dental services, case management, systems advocacy, and more.

Volunteers are needed for *Our Promise*. Hours would be during the day (Mon-Fri, 1pm-5pm range) and include filing, administrative work, organizing mail, cleaning, serving, and stocking food/beverages. *Our Promise* can be reached by phone at 973-644-0100 or email at <u>ourpromise@familypromisemorris.org</u>.


# Meyersville Presbyterian Church Book Club
