Pastor's Letter

Once again, we have arrived at the beginning of the Christian Year with the season of Advent. It is so easy to say that Advent is that four weeks

between Thanksgiving and Christmas when we have to do all the stuff: the decorating, the buying of gifts, and the partying that all go into making Christmas what it is. For many, Advent would seem to take it's cue from Black Friday as the season of running exhausted to get everything done. However, to think of Advent this way is to do this very precious season a great disservice.

One of my memories of college and seminary was going home and leaving all of the pressures and work of school behind for a short period of time. We could focus on being with family and friends and celebrating the season of Christmas. In many ways, I like to think of Advent in some of those same ways. Except for this year, many of the Hebrew Scriptures used during the season of Advent come from what I call Second Isaiah (Isaiah chapters 40-55), and they speak of the exiles going home to Judah. We come out of the darkness of our lives of the world, out of our exiles, and we go home to the light of God in the birth of Christ.

Robert Frost wrote a piece entitled, "The Death of the Hired Man." In the prose he writes:

"Home is the place where, when you have to go there, They have to take you in." "I should have called it Something you somehow haven't to deserve."

During Advent, we make our way to God's home in a stable at Christmas knowing that God will take us in even if we don't deserve it. That is the good news of the season of Advent--we can make the journey trusting that we will be let into the Christmas story. Will you walk that journey with me and your family at First Presbyterian Church-Stirling? I hope so, and I hope you will invite friends to join you in the journey.



May God bless each of us in our Advent journey.

# Per-Capita Apportionment

For 2020, our per-capita apportionment to the Presbytery, Synod, and General Assembly is **\$39 per member**. I want to stress that this money is important for the life of the Presbyterian Church. It pays the costs of the denomination. I believe it is imperative that we pay our per-capita this year since we are getting a lot of assistance from the Presbytery with our talks with Meyersville about the future of the two churches. Two people from Presbytery have attended all of our FLHiP meetings, and Rev. Jeanne Radak, the Presbytery Leader, has been instrumental in leading us through the process. The denomination is helping us in very real ways.

I would also remind you, as I have in the past, that the Presbytery has to send our money for the Synod and General Assembly to those governing bodies. When we don't pay all of our per-capita, we are taking money away from Presbytery. Therefore, I ask you to pay the per-capita for everyone in your family who is a member. The <u>Per Capita</u> envelope can be found in the front of your offering envelopes box. Thank you.

# **Bathroom Upgrades**

As noted in the September Stirling Stuff, upgrades to the restrooms at the church complex were approved. Six new toilets have been installed, including the Ladies' Room, Men's Room, and the LHMS bathrooms downstairs. The installation of the first floor manse toilet will occur shortly.

# Memorial Garden Renovation

Some of you may have noticed that our Memorial Garden, which was built approximately 17 years ago, has fallen into a state of disrepair. Numerous trees have died, and there has been a problem with the gates to the arbors, which cannot be opened and closed properly. Additionally, some of the bluestone slabs are sinking.

At its November meeting, the Session voted to make repairs to the Memorial Garden and restore it to a place of beauty and tranquility for remembrance and meditation. A proposal by Fitz's Fish Ponds has been approved. Do not be confused by the name of the contractor; we are NOT installing a fish pond! However, they were selected because they have proposed an imaginative and innovative plan for the garden, including a trellised southern magnolia, a weeping redbud, a Japanese maple, Japanese Acubas and hydrangeas, among other new plants. They are also going to rebuild the arbors, replace the gate posts, and the sinking bluestone slabs, all at a very reasonable price.

This work is being paid for with money given to the Memorial Garden over the years and from fees paid when a person's ashes are interred. The current fee to be interred in the garden is \$400. The ashes of those interred must be in a biodegradable container, or the ashes must be taken out of the container and placed in the ground. We only allow members and family of members to be buried in the garden.

If you would like to contribute to this project and the continued upkeep of the Memorial Garden, please note "Memorial Garden" on your donation. Watch for information regarding a "re-opening" celebration which will be held once the work is complete.

If you are interested in becoming a part of the Memorial Garden Committee, please contact a member of Session or Lynn Blakeslee, who has been spearheading this project. If you have questions about the Memorial Garden, please speak with Lynn or Rev. Peters.
