Pastor's Letter

Recently, the following headline came out from the Environmental Defense Fund:

Human activity puts 1 million species of plants and animals at risk of extinction, a startling report from the United Nations showed recently.



Such a sobering warning should cause us to pause in our tracks and consider what that would mean. It would create huge holes in the food chain of the earth. Even if people are not sure this is true, we have to wonder, "if we wait to see if it is true and it is, then will it be too late to do anything about it?"

Today, as I write this, we have just had a major rain storm come through. It is from the weather system that caused approximately 80 tornadoes and took the lives of some people in the Midwest. Maybe it is not due to climate change; but, if we wait to be sure, if and when we find that it is, it will be too late to do anything about it, and the world's coastlines will dramatically change.

Some will say this is not a religious issue, but I beg to differ. It is a religious issue because the Bible calls us to be good stewards of <u>ALL</u> the resources entrusted to us. The earth and the climate are a part of those resources. We must start doing a better job, or we may hand a catastrophe off to future generations-- a catastrophe from which they will not be able to recover.

How can we even begin to deal with this? Is it not too big for us? We need to change our thinking. There is a Navajo Chant that teaches us where we need to begin:



The mountains, I become part of it. . . The herbs, the fir tree, I become part of it. The morning mists, the clouds, the gathering waters, I become part of it. The wilderness, the dew drops, the pollen. . . I become part of it. <sup>1.</sup>

We need to begin to see ourselves as a part of the world around us. We are not apart from the earth, from the life of other people, animals, and plants. If they suffer, we suffer. We grow from being firmly rooted in and with the earth. Until we see it all as sacred -- none of it is sacred. May God help us find our sacred connection with everything in the Earth.
