Pastor's Letter

As you read this, we are in the midst of the Season of Eastertide, or just *Easter*. This season lasts for 7 weeks, until the Day of Pentecost, which is on June 9th this year. This season reminds us that the news of the tomb being empty is too big to celebrate for only one day. Granted, we don't hear the Easter story every Sunday during this season, but the scriptures ask us the question of, "How should the Good News of Christ's resurrection be reflected in our daily living?"



Two days ago, we were met with the scene of the great Notre Dame Cathedral burning. Even as the flames were rising above the stonework of the walls of the nave, the news commentators were already talking about how the great edifice would be rebuilt, and would it look like what it was before the fire. I think of this as I think about the resurrection of Jesus and how our lives should be radically different after Easter from before Easter. In relation to Notre Dame, I think of the bombed out hulk of the cathedral in Coventry, England. When it was time to rebuild, they left the ruins as a sacred spot dedicated to the horror and cost of war and built a modern gothic cathedral next to it. The following is a piece taken from the Coventry Cathedral website.

The interior of the iconic new Cathedral provides many surprises. During the Second World War, the then senior clergyman of the Cathedral, Provost Richard Howard, witnessed the way Christians of all denominations came together to pray – for themselves, for peace and for their enemies – and conceived of an ecumenical space within a future, new Coventry Cathedral. The revolutionary and boundary-breaking nature of this idea should never be under-estimated. The Chapel of Unity is that unique space.

The Chapel of Unity is a part of the cathedral complex. Like Cathedrals being transformed, we too should be transformed by the good news of the third day. The season of Easter, indeed every Sunday, is our opportunity to be transformed by the love and grace of our God who seeks to transform us into true disciples of Jesus Christ. How has the third day transformed you?

Mission of the Month - May

Three historically black churches were intentionally burned over a period of ten days in the southern Louisiana St. Landry Parish. Each fire caused extensive damage to the churches. Fortunately, no deaths or injuries were reported. During the month of May, our congregation will take up a special collection in support of the three churches. Upcoming Mission of the Month - June

The Deacons are once again working with the Church World Service (CWS) and their "Blanket Month Appeal" for our June Mission of the Month. In 2018, CWS distributed thousands of woolen blankets throughout the world, and they are hoping to do the same this year. The blankets, which cost \$10 each, have been used in many ways – to help families who have been driven from their homes due to hurricanes, tornados, or other disasters; to keep the homeless warm; to carry personal belongings; and, to cover a window broken in a storm to keep the cold air out. A sample blanket will be available for you to see during Fellowship Hour. We will be collecting \$10 per blanket during the entire month of June. You may use



the special envelopes in the pews to enclose your gift, or give it to Shaylyn Gallagan or another Deacon. We hope you will support this worthy endeavor.

Art England Has Moved


