Pastor's Letter

In his book, *Tattoos On The Heart*, Fr. Gregory Boyle tells a story about Mother Teresa:



Mother Teresa once told a roomful of lepers how loved by God they were and a “gift to the rest of us.” Interrupting her, an old leper raises his hand, and she calls on him. “Could you repeat that again? It did me good. So, would you mind . . . just saying it again.”

In September, we will be entering our 8th month of dealing with Covid 19. We all are tired of it, not just from dealing with the changes it has made to our lives, not just with the fear of catching it, but also of having to think about it, and being aware of it all the time. AND, we are entering the most divisive presidential election in modern times. Many people did not get the vacation they were hoping for this summer. People are tired, they are angry, and they are short with each other. We miss our old normal, but there doesn't really seem to be any attempt on the part of many to get along or to say something nice to those with whom they disagree.

I offer the story of Mother Teresa because it is something we all need to be reminded of---the importance of being kind and gracious to everyone. When we are kind to others, it humanizes them and enables them to be more human with us. This is a witness that the church of Jesus Christ can offer to the world. In my sermon on August 16th, I shared that anything we say or do that emphasizes an “us” and “them” separation is a sin. We are all in this together. Lately I've been reading Andrew Chaikin's book, *A Man On The Moon: The Voyage of the Apollo Astronauts*. It's a behind-the-scenes look at NASA's Apollo program. Chaikin shares some of Buzz Aldrin's thoughts from when he was on the moon with Neil Armstrong during Apollo 11:

By international agreement, no nation could claim the moon, even one that managed to go there . . . He (Aldrin) had an almost mystical sense of the unity of humankind, so strong that he felt as if he and Armstrong were not alone.

We are all together on this ball we call Earth, and we have to learn to get along. We have to care about and for each other. It's the only way we can get through the trials and crises that beset us. May God give us the hearts to not only believe this but live it by seeing, like Mother Teresa, the gift that each and every person is to us and to our world. It is not easy, but we need to work at it.



Worship Schedule for September

Our final **Shared Summer Service with Meyersville Presbyterian Church** will be held on **September 6th at 9:30 a.m.** outdoors in Stirling, weather permitting, and will be led by Rev. Peters. The on-line worship service will be led by Rev. Aspinall, and you will receive an email with the link to that service.

Worship services on September 13th–27th will be hosted online and outdoors by **FPC at 10:00 a.m.** At its August meeting, Session decided that we will not be worshipping in the sanctuary through the month of September. Remember, if you come to the outdoor service you need to do the following:

- ❖ Wear a mask
- ❖ Sanitize your hands before you sign the tracking log
- ❖ Sign the tracking log
- ❖ Copy a bulletin and bring it with you; or, take one that is provided, but there won't be many
- ❖ If you take a folding chair, please wipe it with a provided sanitizer wipe when you put it back
- ❖ Drop your offering in the offering plate on the sanitizing table
- ❖ Sit six feet apart from other family groups
- ❖ Rev. Peters will put the word out on Saturday afternoon if the outdoor service is canceled. The outdoor and indoor services will be the same.




Church Website & Facebook Page



The book club will be meeting via **Zoom** on Tuesday, September 29th, 7:30 p.m., to discuss "The Moonstone," a novel by Wilkie Collins. Everyone is welcome to join; please let Rev. Aspinall or Jan Somers know so that you receive the Zoom link for the discussion. Rev. Aspinall has copies of the book available.



Originally published in 1868 in serialized form in Charles Dickens' magazine, The Moonstone is considered the first modern detective novel. Many of the elements we consider part of the detective genre were first included in The Moonstone. An English country house robbery, an "inside job," a celebrated investigator, the bungling local police, lots of false suspects, and reconstruction of the crime were all first elements of this story.

"The Moonstone is a page-turner", writes Carolyn Heilbrun. "It catches one up and unfolds its amazing story through the recounting of its several narrators, all of them enticing and singular." Wilkie Collins's spellbinding tale of romance, theft, and murder inspired a hugely popular genre—the detective mystery. Hinging on the theft of an enormous diamond originally stolen from an Indian shrine, this riveting novel features the innovative Sergeant Cuff, the hilarious house steward Gabriel Betteridge, a lovesick housemaid, and a mysterious band of Indian jugglers.


