Dear Church Family,

The poet W.H. Auden composed a long poem in 1944 called *For the Time Being: A Christmas Oratorio* in which the various characters of the Christmas story speak in modern English in a contemporary context. Auden portrays King Herod as an eminently



practical man who looks out over the civilization he rules with some satisfaction. He laments, however, the lack of routine and the lack of good common sense among the people, as evidenced by their reliance on Ouija boards, crystals, alchemy, and amulets. Despite all he has done for them, Herod finds that people still want a savior. "Legislation is helpless against the wild prayer of longing that rises, day in, day out, from all these households under my protection." The savior he says these people want, however, is one who will come on the peoples' own terms, who will arrive in a box to serve what they believe to be their immediate needs. He mocks their prayers: "O God, put away justice and truth for we cannot understand them and do not want them. Eternity would bore us dreadfully. Leave the heavens and come down to our earth…become our uncle. Look after Baby, amuse Grandfather, escort Madam to the Opera, help Willy with his homework, introduce Muriel to a handsome naval officer. Be interesting and weak like us, and we will love you as we love ourselves."

Later, in exasperation, Herod explains, "I asked for a God who should be as like me as possible. What use to me is a God whose divinity consists in doing different things that I cannot do or saying clever things that I cannot understand? The God I want and intend to get must be someone I can recognize immediately without having to wait and see what he says or does. There must be nothing in the least extraordinary about him. Produce him at once, please. I'm sick of waiting."

As we begin our annual Advent preparation, there can be a sameness and routine to our anticipation of the birth of our Savior. In our practical and sensible way, we plod through the season, the awesome wonder and grace of the Incarnation somehow eluding us. To the extent we look for God at all, we look for one who will do what we want and give us what we think we need. We know in our heads that this is ridiculous – that God does as God chooses, and not as we think we want. However, it can be another matter to live each day with expectant waiting, with hope, and with wonder and awe at what God has done, is continuing to do, and may do in the future. Because God will most assuredly interrupt our best laid plans; God will definitely disrupt our comfort; God will undoubtedly surprise us.

So, my wish for you is that you will be surprised this year at Christmas. May we all be astonished by the wonderfully remarkable thing that God has done in coming to us in Jesus the Christ.





Beginning Sunday, November 28, the first Sunday in Advent, a Daily Advent Devotional published by Presbyterian Outlook will be available. Included for each day of Advent is a Scripture reading, a brief meditation, and a prayer. The devotional will be emailed one week at a time to the congregation. For those who would like a hard copy, they will be in the narthex and in the church office. About the devotional:

"Hope is hard to find during a long pandemic. Dark feelings of grief, loss, anger, betrayal, and despair plague our souls and our communities. As the light fades and the evenings grow long this December, the season of Advent reminds us that God is with us in the night."

We can see and observe God at work in the dark, marvel at the beauty of creation lit by moon and stars, and rest from the day's labor. Darkness is often associated with evil and suffering, but a devotional exploration of "night" bears witness to Christ's Good News. Exploring biblical happenings that occur at night – visions, angel visits, prisoners set free – we will move through this Advent season as watchful disciples, keeping vigil for the One who is promised to arrive like a thief in the night.

Mission of the Month - December

The Market Street Mission in Morristown has been designated for the Mission of the Month again for December. Throughout the Covid-19 Pandemic, they have continued to provide 200 meals each day to those in immediate need.

They also provide recovery programs and vocational training to those rebuilding their lives, community counseling services, and "regularly scheduled meetings and services that give people a solid foundation for stable lives." In 2020, the Market Street Mission provided 86,207 meals to the homeless and poor in Morris County, hosted 21,316 shelter stays, and had 36 graduates from their *Life Change* recovery program.

- I am happy to report an all-time high collection of 12 turkeys in November. One was distributed locally and eleven were delivered to the Market Street Mission. Thank you to everyone from both churches and the community who donated a turkey to this very worthy cause!
- <u>Monetary gifts collected through *Mission of the Month* will help them care for an individual's immediate needs today and their long-term needs for a stable and independent tomorrow.</u>

ShopRite Gift Cards



Do you shop at ShopRite? Well, then, you cannot afford to pass up this deal to help support the church in another small way. For the past several years, the church has been purchasing ShopRite gift cards (known as our *Voucher Program*) to sell on Sunday mornings. For every \$100 sold, the church earns \$5; that is, we get 5% of all sales. Over the course of a year, at times that has translated to more than a \$1,000 earned.

The gift cards come in \$20, \$50, and \$100 denominations. They never expire; you can continue to use them until the balance is used up. 
