Pastor's Message

Dear Church Family,



The following is a condensed version of the sermon I preached on Sunday, and Prayers

July 11th, after hearing of the passing into the Church Triumphant of the Rev. Dr. Thomas T. Peters, pastor of the church for 30 years.

For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord. Romans 8:38,39

Do you remember the nightmares you had when you were a child? The recurring ones? I think mine mostly took two different forms – the being chased ones and the chasing ones. Today, I want to talk about the chasing ones – the kind in which someone, a parent usually, is walking away and, despite calling and running, you never catch up. Whoever it is just keeps walking away and doesn't stop, doesn't turn back. Psychologists would say, I think, that the chasing dream is usually about death – fear that the loved one we are chasing would die. For a child, this fear has to do with the deprivation of love and also with survival – the loss of the one who takes care of us, who loves us no matter what - is a very scary idea. These dreams can continue into our grown-up lives as well.

What gives this particular chasing nightmare its power is that it touches one of our most primal fears: being left alone, deprived of the ones who love us. That need to feel connected, to be joined to and accepted by someone who loves us, to feel therefore safe, is one of the deepest needs of our species. Little wonder we are so attracted to orphan characters in literature — from Orphan Annie to Harry Potter. We see in these characters our worst fears realized and so we root for them because we are simultaneously grateful that it's not us in this predicament and hopeful that we'd face it with the same measure of grit and grace and with the same good outcome.

These days we are facing a fear that I suspect most of us having been harboring for a little while. As the news of Tom's illness got more and more worrying, the fear got closer and tighter in. We kept hoping, we kept praying, but Tom's ability to fight the transplant rejection could not keep up with the power of the illness. And so we are looking for answers, looking for some kind of justification for this blow to our expectations and our hopes, and the blow to our sense of justice and fairness. We think about the retirement not enjoyed, what a good person Tom was, and our own and the world's loss of such a fine, good, man. It isn't fair.

And I have to say that I don't have an answer for this loss, this injustice. I can't rationalize it or make sense of it either. I don't think we human beings really get to have that. What we get are love and assurance from Scripture, and we have the experience of those who have lost loved ones who can tell us about their experiences of grief and healing and hope.

Paul, in his letter to the Romans, acknowledges our deep fear of loss, fear of the chaos of things not being right, of the injustice of bad things happening to good people – things like hardship, persecution, peril,

war, injustice, illness, death. Paul acknowledges the reality of all those things. He knows they are real; the people in those little churches in Rome that Paul was writing to who were being fed to lions knew they are real. And, of course, we know they are real.

Paul did not provide an explanation to those persecuted and courageous Roman Christians. He did not provide a reason for their suffering, nor did he provide pie in the sky hope. He said in strong words that the suffering is real, and in equally strong terms, that the presence of God is real – and what is more, that there is nothing that can possibly ever get between us and God's love for us. Psalm 23 says something similar: "Yea though I walk through the shadow of death, Thou art with me." Not, I will take away the shadow; not I will fix this world for you, but I am with you, and I am for you.

And what is more, Jesus — the one who preached God's kingdom and embodied God's love, the one who suffered and died on the cross, who knows all about suffering and the experience of feeling lost, alone, ditched — this Jesus is now interceding for us. And since this is true, our future and hope are assured. Then comes the best part, the part so stirring we almost always read it at funerals: "For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord." And there it is — Paul addressing our deepest needs and deepest fears — that chasing dream, that fear of being left alone and uncared for. We will not, cannot, be separated from God. No matter what nightmares we may dream or experience, no matter where we may go or what we may do, no matter even what may be done to us, nothing can separate us from God. Paul's list of possible separating nightmares is meant to be exhaustive, but of course we could add our own. However, it really doesn't matter what we could come up with because: "Nothing will be able to separate us from God!"

So, I cannot answer the question of why bad things happen to good people – a question as old as forever. What Paul says in the face of suffering is that God's love is with us. We get words of God's love; we get assurances of God's presence; we get faith; we get hope.

If there were ever a message we need to hear in this transient and fear-ridden world, a world in which the medicine didn't work, in which a very good, beloved man dies, it's this one: our God loves us...all of us...forever...no matter what...and nothing — no, nothing! — can separate us from God's love!

Gracious God, we say to Jesus along with the man whose son was possessed, Lord, I believe, help my unbelief. We pray for trust in your Word; we pray for confidence in your presence; we pray for peace in our grieving hearts. Amen.



Mission of the Month - July & August

For the summer months, the Deacons have selected **Bridges Outreach** to be the focus of our **Mission of the Month**. Many of you are familiar with our <u>Bridges Lunch</u> Program, where we provide 40 lunches monthly.



Bridges Outreach, located in Summit, did not let the pandemic stop their efforts to make an impact on the lives of many homeless people living in Newark, Irvington, Summit, and NYC. Although their volunteer base was smaller this past year, they kept the faith and continued to make an amazing difference for the homeless population they serve. Their mission is "Bridges ends homelessness through volunteer-driven outreach and individual case management focusing on health, housing, and independence. We form relationships with those experiencing homelessness while meeting their most urgent needs."

Each year, more than 2,000 volunteers deliver 65,000 brown bag meals, 10,000 pairs of socks and underwear, 7,500 toiletry kits, 49,000 cups of soup, and literally tons of donated clothing to over 21,000 people in Newark, Irvington, and NYC. In addition to their street outreach, they provide case management services at their **Project Connect** office in Newark, meet with people in Summit every Friday for their **Neighbors in Need** program, and provide new backpacks and school supplies to more than 1,000 children eligible for free and reduced lunch in Summit and sheltered children in Newark and Irvington.

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<u>Update on the May-June Mission of the Month - CWS Blanket Program</u>



During the months of May and June, <u>our congregation donated \$320.00</u> for the Church World Service (CWS) Blanket Program through the Mission of the Month program. Through the amazing enthusiasm of our church family, we provided funds for <u>thirty-two warm woolen blankets</u> for those in need. These versatile blankets are used to keep the homeless warm, carry personal belongings, cover a window broken in a storm to keep the cold out, as a tent or ground covering, and in many other ways. <u>A big **Thank You** to everyone who participated</u>.



Memorial Day Parade





The Book Club's current selection is "<u>The Nickel Boys</u>," a novel by Colson Whitehead. <u>The group will meet via Zoom on Monday, August 16th, 7:30 p.m.</u> to discuss the book. <u>The Nickel Boys</u> describes life in a reform school. Whitehead based Nickel Academy on the real life Dozier School, a Florida facility that ran for over a century, until a university investigation publicized its racist and abusive practices.

The story recounts the life of an African American boy, Elwood Curtis, growing up in Florida during the early years of the Civil Rights movement. Elwood, who lives with his grandmother, is dutiful, industrious, and filled with idealism. He excels in school, works hard, and has a strong support network of teachers, his employer, and his grandmother, who envision a bright future for young Elwood. Their hopes seem fulfilled when Elwood gets

into a local Black college, where he will take advanced classes available to high-achieving high school students. The college is far from Elwood's home, so he decides to hitch a ride rather than walking the seven miles. After a man driving a stolen car picks him up, a police officer pulls them over. Elwood is implicated in the theft, and a judge sentences him to time in Nickel Academy, a notorious institution for juvenile offenders.
