Beginning with my ordination in 1985, I have served five different churches in various capacities as well as many others as pulpit supply while raising three young children. But now I am ready to start the next chapter in my life. February 28th will be my last day serving both the First Presbyterian and Meyersville Churches.

The Sessions of First Presbyterian and Meyersville have been meeting together to make plans for the future. They have decided to call a full-time pastor together – someone who will serve both churches. The Sessions have formed a search committee and have been working with Presbytery's Committee on Ministry liaison, Sharon Guthrie, who has successfully assisted a number of churches with the pastor selection process. Sherry will help guide our search committee through the process of finding a new pastor to lead and serve these two wonderful and devoted congregations as they seek God's vision for their futures.

I look forward to these remaining months at FPC. Along with the regular day-to-day and week-to-week ministry that we share, there is still much we will need to do together – a stewardship campaign, Advent and Christmas, election of new officers to the church boards, the annual meeting, and becoming familiar with new technology to live-stream our worship services. All of this leads us to taking the next step in the life of this vibrant congregation. Thank you for the chance to help lead your congregation during these past years.

Special Congregational Meeting

A Special Meeting of the Congregations of both Stirling and Meyersville was held on October 30th. Rev. Aspinall announced that she will be retiring from both congregations, and her last day will be February 28, 2023. She introduced members of the joint search committee who have already begun the search

process. Loura Zijdel from MPC and Ed Gerecht from FPC gave more details and answered questions on the committee's work to this point. If a new minister has not been approved by the end of February, the committee will retain a Bridge Pastor for the duration until a new minister is found.

Ed Gerecht announced that the church secretary, Paulette Irlander, will be retiring at the end of the year, and Jan Somers will be filling that position at both churches. Jan was secretary at FPC years ago, and her previous experience will help make the transition to a new minister easier.

The members of FPC also elected 2 members-at-large to the Nominating Committee for 2023: Carolyn Malfatone and Susan Brodziak.

Twelve Baskets Food Pantry

<u>Our local Food Pantry, Twelve Baskets, has returned to All Saints' in Millington.</u> Jointly sponsored by our church, All Saints', Meyersville, and LHT CERT, the food pantry has been serving guests two Saturday mornings per month. Shelf stable food as well as meat, dairy products, eggs, and fresh produce are available for food insecure families in our area.



Volunteer help is needed to set up tables, put the food out, and then pack it up afterwards. Help is also needed for picking up food from the distribution center in Hillside. Stewardship, November 2022

One day a pastor went visiting. He stopped at the home of one of his parishioners who was a farmer. He found the farmer out working in a field. The pastor stood admiring the field and said to the farmer, "What a beautiful field of wheat God has made." The farmer replied, "Yes, but you should have seen it when God had it all to Himself."

Just like a field needs cultivating for the good gifts of God to thrive, so does our spirit of generosity need cultivating to grow and develop into a ministry that is effective and meaningful and satisfying



for the generous person. Generosity is something we learn. It rarely comes to us by nature, and the culture around us does not appear to encourage generosity. The priority of our world seems to be acquisitions and then guarding and protecting what has been acquired.

Jesus, on the other hand, continually told stories about people who shared, gave, helped, forgave – all calling us to widen and deepen our understanding of what it means to be generous.

Our theme for our stewardship program this year will be "Cultivating Generosity." We will be talking about how we are called to allow a spirit of generosity to grow within our own hearts as faithful people of God and in our families and other relationships. Generosity is certainly not only a matter of how much money we give to the church; it is the underlying understanding of ourselves as people who have been given gifts and that God then gives us opportunities to share those gifts. Sometimes generosity might take the form of patience with the foibles of others; it might be an opportunity to turn the other cheek; it might mean giving time to someone who is lonely; and, of course, it also means sharing what we have with the church so that the church can continue to serve as Christ's body in the world.

Stewardship Sunday will be November 13th when we will dedicate our pledges for the coming year. The congregation will be receiving a letter and pledge cards in the mail between now and then.

Mission of the Month - November

Our November Mission of the Month will be the Market Street Mission in

<u>Morristown</u>. Each Thanksgiving for many years, members and friends of our church have stepped up and donated their free turkeys to Market Street Mission to help in their effort to provide a delicious Thanksgiving dinner to homeless individuals. Since



1889, the Mission has been a refuge for those facing poverty, homelessness, and addiction. Currently, they provide 250 meals each day to those in immediate need. Besides providing much needed meals, this organization also provides recovery programs and vocational training to those rebuilding their lives, community counseling services, and "regularly scheduled meetings and services that give people a solid foundation for stable lives." This year we will again support the Market Street Mission in two ways:



- If you are eligible for a free turkey from the supermarket and do not plan to use it, please consider donating it. Tom Parziale will be at the church from 10-11 a.m. on Sat., November 19th, to collect the turkeys. He will then deliver them to Morristown. Please keep turkeys frozen.
- A special monetary gift will be collected throughout the month of November. This will help the Mission care for an individual's immediate needs today and their long-term needs for a stable and independent tomorrow. Please place your donation in the offering plate or send it directly to

the church or Elsie Turqman. Please note "Mission of the Month," and remember to include your name and/or your envelope number if you would like your donation to be recorded. We hope you will support this worthy endeavor.


Heritage Sunday

Homemade Thanksgiving Pies



Growing up in the modest farmlands of Battle Creek, Michigan, Marjorie was inspired by a few simple rules: always think for yourself, never take success for granted, and work hard—even when deemed American royalty, even while covered in imperial diamonds. Marjorie had an insatiable drive to live and love and to give more than she got. From crawling through Moscow warehouses to rescue the Tsar's treasures to outrunning the Nazis in London, from serving the homeless of the Great Depression to entertaining Roosevelts, Kennedys, and Hollywood's biggest stars, Marjorie Merriweather Post lived an epic life few could imagine.

Marjorie's journey began gluing cereal boxes in her father's barn as a young girl. No one could have predicted that C. W. Post's Cereal Company would grow into the General Foods empire and reshape the American way of life, with Marjorie as its heiress and leading lady. Not content to stay in her prescribed roles of high-society wife, mother, and hostess, Marjorie dared to demand more, making history in the process. Before turning thirty she amassed millions, becoming the wealthiest woman in the United States. But it was her life-force, advocacy, passion, and adventurous spirit that led to her stunning legacy.

And yet Marjorie's story, though full of beauty and grandeur, set in the palatial homes she built such as Mar-a-Lago, was equally marked by challenge and tumult. A wife four times over, Marjorie sought her happily-ever-after with the blue-blooded party boy who could not outrun his demons, the charismatic financier whose charm turned to betrayal, the international diplomat with a dark side, and the bon vivant whose shocking secrets would shake Marjorie and all of society. Marjorie did everything on a grand scale, especially when it came to love.

Bestselling and acclaimed author Allison Pataki has crafted an intimate portrait of a larger-than-life woman, a powerful story of one woman falling in love with her own voice and embracing her own power while shaping history in the process.
