Sadly nodding his head, he walked out. She wondered what that was all about. She was puzzled until she read the card on the bouquet. I may want to stop counting birthdays, but it is not time to stop counting blessings, and perhaps even begin to look around with more conscious awareness of the treasure that is human life. We human beings hold a special place in God's creation. And God continually reaches out to remind us of our unique position in the universe and our unique responsibility for caring for the earth and its marvels. It is to us that God sends prophets to speak God's Word. And it is to us that God has given a Savior. It is to us that God has given the ability to love –imperfectly to be sure – but love that enlivens and gives meaning to our relationships with family, friends, community.

On second thought, I think I will continue to count birthdays. All that counting will remind me to count my blessings as well.

Twelve Baskets Food Pantry Has Moved to Our Church!

Our local Food Pantry, Twelves Baskets, currently housed at All Saints' Church in Millington, **will be temporarily moving to our church for the months of July, August, and September**. Jointly sponsored by our church, All Saints', Meyersville, and LHT Cert, the food pantry has been serving guests two Saturday mornings per month. Shelf stable food as well as meat, dairy products, eggs, and fresh produce are available for food insecure families in our area.

Some of the food will be stored at our church, and guests will come there on scheduled Saturday mornings. Volunteer help will be needed to set up tables and put out the food in Pollard Hall. Help is also needed for picking up food from the distribution center in Hillside. There is plenty to do and the volunteer opportunities are well organized. Looking Ahead - Mission of the Month - September and October

The Deacons are once again working with Church World Service (CWS) and their "Blanket Month Appeal" for our September and October Mission of the Month. In the past few years, CWS has distributed thousands of woolen blankets throughout the world, and they are hoping to do the same this year. The blankets, which cost \$10 each, have been used in many ways - to help families who have been driven from their

homes due to hurricanes, tornados, or other disasters; to keep the homeless warm; to carry personal belongings; to cover a window broken in a storm to keep the cold air out; and as a tent or ground covering to name just a few ways.

ShopRite Gift Cards



For the past several years, the church has been selling ShopRite gift cards (known as our *Voucher Program*). For every \$100 sold, the church earns \$5; that is, we get 5% of all sales. Over the course of a year, at times that has translated to more than a \$1,000 earned.

The gift cards come in \$20, \$50, and \$100 denominations. They never expire; you can continue to use them until the balance is used up. Meyersville Book Club

The Book Club's current selection is, **"Kafka on the Shore,"** a novel by Haraki Murakami. <u>The group will **meet via Zoom**</u> <u>on Wednesday, August 3rd, 7:30 p.m.</u> to discuss the book. Everyone is welcome to join the group; please contact Rev. Aspinall so she can send you the Zoom link. The book is available at local libraries.



Comprising two distinct but interrelated plots, the narrative runs back and forth between both plots, in alternating chapters:

The odd-numbered chapters tell the 15-year-old Kafka's story as he runs away from his father's house to escape an Oedipal curse and to embark upon a quest to find his mother and sister. After a series of adventures, he finds shelter in a quiet, private library in Takamatsu, run by the distant and aloof Miss Saeki and the intelligent and more welcoming Oshima. There he spends his days reading the unabridged Richard Francis Burton translation of "One Thousand and One Nights" and the collected works of Natsume Sōseki until the police begin inquiring after him in connection with the murder of his father that he does not know he has committed. Oshima brings him to the forests of Kōchi Prefecture, where Kafka is ultimately healed.

The even-numbered chapters tell Nakata's story. They start with military reports of a strange incident in Yamanashi Prefecture where multiple children, including Nakata, collapse in the woods - Nakata, after the incident, is the only one of the children who came out of the incident without any memory and unable to read and write. The incident is initially blamed on poisonous gas, but it is later revealed that it was the result of a lustful teacher beating Nakata. Later in the book, it is shown that due to his uncanny abilities, Nakata has found part-time work in his old age as a finder of lost cats. Having finally located and returned one particular cat to its owners, Nakata finds that the circumstances of the case have put him on a path which, unfolding one step at a time before him, takes the illiterate man far away from his familiar and comforting home territory. Nakata kills a man named Johnnie Walker, a cat murderer. He takes a gigantic leap of faith in going on the road for the first time in his life, unable even to read a map and without knowing where he will eventually end up. He befriends a truck driver named Hoshino, who takes him on as a passenger in his truck and soon becomes very attached to the old man. He heads for Takamatsu, an unknown force driving him there.
